


~ FROM THE RECTOR ~

Why do we do what we do? Why do we pray prayers asking for peace, compassion, strength, wisdom, and endurance? Why do we read the scriptures, listening to the tales of God overcoming obstacles, of faith sustaining people, of the healing that is found when people come together in God's name? Why do we sing hymns to bring gratitude and praise to our lips? Why do we listen to sermons talking about gratitude and compassion and community and God's presence? Why do we come to church over and over again? Why do we do religion religiously?

There are, of course, many reasons. But, largely, we do it to be prepared. While I don't believe that "there's gonna be a quiz at your ascension," as the lyric from Godspell says. (By the way, be sure to come watch Godspell with us in the parish hall this Sunday at 2pm!) However, life certainly gives us many tests. And, the better prepared we are for them, the more easily we'll pass them.

Recently, life gave us what would be, for many, an extremely daunting test. The sky was falling as the sprinkler system gave way. As is so often the case in life, the pressure built up until the system could no longer sustain it. And water (and lots of soggy acoustic tile) came rushing down upon us, flooding the very areas that we hold most dear: the places where we worship, have fellowship, and raise our children. This, by all objective measures, should have been a major blow.



But, what was our response? Within moments of learning of the crisis, members of ECOHS were wading through the water, working to limit the impact. As soon as folks were able they came together, eager to help, eager to serve.

Since that time, we have come together to worship in a far more intimate setting, and it has been wonderful. The crisis, rather than driving us apart, literally brought us closer together. The overall mood of the church has been more relaxed, more friendly, quicker to laughter, quicker to express love and appreciation. Crises can cause strife, frustration, anger, anxiety and fear. But, all I've seen since this event is quite the opposite: a community that has increased in love, concord, and unity.

And this is why we do what we do. Through worship, praise, prayer, service, and other forms of spiritual development, we have habituated our responses in all aspects of life. When you have love in your heart and on your lips, what need do you have of fear or rancor? When you have peace and concord, what power does strife and frustration have over you? When God is for us, and we are for God, who can be against us?

So, we passed the test with flying colors! A-pluses and gold stars all around, y'all! I cannot wait to see what—through the power of the Holy Spirit—we can accomplish next!

Christmas Day Building Damage

I think most parishioners are aware that our church building suffered substantial damage from frozen and burst fire sprinkler lines on Christmas evening. We believe that the first sprinkler line break happened shortly after everyone left the building from the Christmas day service. This caused an alarm and the fire department responded and shut off fire suppression water in the vault located in the ground in front of the building. They were unable to notify anyone and taped a note on the front door which I discovered around 6:30 PM that day. At that point, there were additional broken lines and residual water in the system was pouring out of the parish hall ceiling. The fire department was called to the site again and they were able to open valves and drain the systems. In all, there were five breaks in the fire suppression systems. These caused damage to the narthex, nave, chapel, parish hall and preschool.

Special thanks to Dee Rausin, Meg & Kenny Davenport and Fr. Brandon for coming to the church Christmas night to help with getting the standing water up. Many of the vestry and staff folks arrived the next day to start moving items from the affected areas. Our insurance company also quickly got North Metro Mitigation Service involved and we soon had a sea of blowers and dehumidifiers going inside the building. These quick efforts minimized the damage and prevented any mold from forming. Materials and supplies in the preschool were packed up into 332 boxes so we can proceed with floor, wall and ceiling replacement.

We have been able to continue with preschool, worship services, AA meetings and other activities in spite of the damages. We are worshiping for the time being in the old original part of the parish hall where Holy Spirit's first worship services were held back in the 1970's. I anticipate that we should have repairs completed prior to the end of February and be back worshiping in the nave with full use of the parish hall and preschool facilities.

A special task force composed of myself, Beth Jones, Dane Bohnstedt and Bob Hitch are leading the restoration efforts and working with the insurance company and various contractors. Please keep us in your thoughts and prayers as we quickly get the restoration done.



December income was higher than budgeted giving us a \$13K net for the month but did include some pledge prepayment for 2023. Expenses were higher than budgeted primarily due to a double payment to the diocese to complete our pledge for the year. We had budgeted a \$22K deficit for the year but ended with an actual \$33K deficit.
